# Artisan Development with ADEA TZ

### 2007

- Artisans take on greater responsibilities by covering the majority of production costs and receiving increased wages.
- Artisans M. Tiago (carver), (S. Ligombai) and A. Mwambe (painters) became the leaders of their skill groups and oversee quality control, orders and production
- ADEA TZ office doubles the size of its showroom /gift shop
- Skill Training Workshops offered.
- ADEA participates twice in a national gift market resulting in four new wholesale clients
- Tanzanian wholesale clientele increased to 11 hotels and gift shops

### <u>2008</u>

- A new line of products focused on the Zanzibar market will be developed.
- New Tanzanian director hired (funds allowing) to expand ADEA TZ's vision and influence.

### 2007


- 81 preschool students enrolled
- 4 teachers trained
- New office to house Boma Schools and Pillars of Maasai
- Development of an umbrella organization to support Maasai helping Maasai
- Items acquired to begin a Maasai cultural museum.

### 2008

- Launch First Grade
- Strategize expansion to neighboring communities with no schools
- Acquire a motorbike to facilitate expansion and transport.
- Develop fundraising strategies for the ongoing needs of schools
- Prepare for architectural students to visit and help explore the development of a Maasai vocabulary for modern buildings
- Build our own campus
- Outfit classrooms fully



## MAKUYA TRADITIONAL ARTS FESTIVAL



### 2007

- Traveled into the Mtwara bush to find traditional village dances
- Filmed and photographed glorious performances to inspire financial support for festival
- Met village elders who grieve the loss of traditional dances, and are eager to impart their knowledge with willing youth
- Saw much enthusiasm for a festival to share and showcase their dancing skills.

### 2008

- Two or three day festival showcasing performing groups in the Mtwara stadium. Festival to include a parade, performances and competitions.
- Establish village dance workshops where elders will teach dances no longer performed and to be highlighted at MaKuYa 2009
- Raise enough funds to make this happen.

### A VISIT FROM MOM AND FRIENDS





## NICK AND LEE "Adventure on Film"





Last year he entered an 18-month masters program in Enschede, Holland on a full scholarship. He will be an asset to ADEA if we are able to secure the funds to bring him and his family to Mtwara. *We will need to secure no less that \$12,000 annually*.
