FROM EAST AFRICA TO EAST LANSING

On August 28, I will begin a four-year PhD program in Educational Policy at Michigan State University. This is a wonderful development for my work with ADEA. The needs of the Maasai and their economic plight are great. It had become clear to me that I could do and offer more if I had additional academic training and a broader exposure to development work. I leave Africa on a positive note. Planning for the 5th annual culture and dance festival is well under way. The artisans in Tanzania are running production on their own. When I return to the US I will be closer to markets and buying trends, allowing me to better advance the group's work. I see this move as a step

forward for ADEA, not a step away.

2012 Developments

- ADEA BOOT CAMP: I conducted a highly effective three-month intensive training program related to finance, business, customer service, program implementation and other leadership skills. Since the camp's conclusion, artisans have managed their office, sales and production nearly 100%.
- Shop Dar es Salaam closes due to mismanagement of shopping center board. We hope to find a new location and re-open as sales were good.
- New products introduced: lemon juicers, tea boxes, baby blanket, and fabric coasters.
- Furniture maker gets electricity in home & work-shop with ADEA support.

- Afri-Mak to become the independent cooperative of the artisans.
- Exploring plans for ethnological museum gift shop market.



2012 Developments

- Classes offered for Kindergarten to fourth grade.
- Community supports teacher wages 11 out of 12 months.
- Launched Ornaments for Hope (O4H) beadwork project to address economic crisis after recent drought devastates cattle and farmland.
- Tipape Loomu, Pillar of Maasai Development's (PMD) director of education, earns MBA degree from Day Star University in Nairobi. Tuition covered by ADEA.
- Tumaina Ole Ipite, PMD director of economic development, attends threemonth ADEA Boot Camp program in Mtwara, and now manages O4H.

2013 Targets

- Seek funding and new markets for Ornaments for Hope initiative.
- Increase number of ornament producers (currently 7 women). Each woman will select and train one woman to create and manage the next production team.
- Produce ornaments for wedding gift market in clients' wedding colors.
- O4H women to receive solar lights to allow for evening work, and eliminate cost and hazards of kerosene.
- Assist Pillar of Maasai Development leadership to achieve various goals, including cement floors installed in current classrooms.

- 2012 Developments
- Secured funds for a fourth year through generous contributions from the Finnish Embassy, BG (British Gas) Tanzania, the Wentworth Africa Fund and Odfjell Drilling.
- 19 troops performed involving over 390 performers.
- Over 3500 people attended.
- MaKuYa received (and continues to receive) TV coverage, thanks to the work of ADEA's codirector, Philipo Lulale.
- MaKuYa festival was attended by the Ambassador of Finland. Donors were pleased and expressed interest to give again.
